RELEVANT SOCP & ESTUARY PLAN POLICIES

Protect and maintain important and sensitive habitat while sensitively integrating development:

- The estuary and adjacent lands provide essential habitat for native wildlife, including threatened and endangered species.
- However, the City's waterfront lands, including areas immediately north and south of the estuary are important and desirable areas for development.

Smart Growth Plan for North Campbell River/Estuary:

The "River Village" Plan was envisioned as a unique and urbane riverside environment with high density and a mix of uses appropriate to the sensitive habitat area.

Village Centre policies:


- Proactively encourage mixed-use development in Village Centres.
- Create pedestrian-oriented, compact nodes with commercial uses and amenities to meet daily needs of residents in surrounding areas.
- Rejuvenate the Campbellton neighborhood while retaining its unique 'gritty' industrial identity and historic character.

CURRENT USES

Current high intensity zoning:

- All the C-4 zones allow a mix of residential and commercial uses
 - » Zones C-4A and B also allow light industrial uses
 - » Maximum height of 38.5 metres
 - » Maximum Floor Area Ratio of 1.5
- The C-5 zone allows waterfront industrial uses





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PROPOSED ZONING UPDATES



REVIEW & POTENTIALLY REZONE HIGH INTENSITY USES

- Review the existing zoning surrounding the estuary to:
- » Better align with the Sustainable Official Community Plan and the Smart Growth Plan for North Campbell River/Estuary; and or
- » Better reflect local market changes since the Estuary Smart Growth Plan was developed (in 2008).
- This could involve rezoning some properties based on their location and current use.
