



### Baikie Island Nature Reserve

Truly a natural wonder... This once-industrial setting has undergone a dramatic transformation. The nature reserve is an ideal retreat for bird watchers, photographers, artists, naturalists, educational groups, families and anyone who wants to spend time in the peace and tranquility of the outdoors and only minutes from town.

On a leisurely stroll out to the Mill Pond you will likely see common mergansers, great blue herons, bald eagles and more. The estuary is particularly fascinating in the fall months when salmon spawn.



### Discovery Pier

Canada's first saltwater fishing pier... located next to the Government Wharf in downtown Campbell River. The Pier extends 150 feet from the shore, is 600 feet long and provides access to high-quality recreational fishing. It's also an ideal setting for sightseeing and evening strolls.

Open 24 hours a day, the Pier is fully lit and has built-in fishing rod holders, bait stands, fish cleaning tables, covered areas, picnic tables and benches. A seasonal concession is open from 7 a.m. 'til dusk. May through October is famous among local residents for the ice cream cones! Fishing rod, tackle rentals and fishing licenses are available at the concession. Please note: Everyone fishing must have a valid fishing license. A community Farmers Market runs from May to October every Sunday morning and into the afternoon.



### McIvor Lake

A summer destination for freshwater fun... McIvor Lake is a popular swimming and boating destination. Bring a picnic lunch and head eight kilometres west on Highway 28, approximately a 15-minute drive. With sandy beaches for swimming, picnic areas for day use, a free boat launch and loads of free parking, it's a recreational paradise.

The road to the lake is gated and locked from 10 p.m. to 5 a.m. daily from May 1st to the September long weekend.



### Robron Park

For sports enthusiasts... The soccer hub of the community, Robron Park is also home to amenities for lacrosse, tennis, and baseball. Plus it hosts a playground and a wood chip trail around the edge of the park. With mountain views, Robron Park is a destination for the entire family.

### Willow Point Splash Park

The big splash... The newly-built Splash Park next to the Sportsplex is for kids of all ages. The park is divided into three play zones; for families, teens, and toddlers with fire hydrants, fire hoses, fishing poles and a mega soaker. And it's free!

Willow Point Park also offers a playground, picnic area, skateboard park, bocce court, disc golf course, tennis courts, sand volleyball court, sports fields, ball hockey court, basketball court and a network of easy walking trails. With its variety of activities, Willow Point Park is a popular year-round recreational destination.

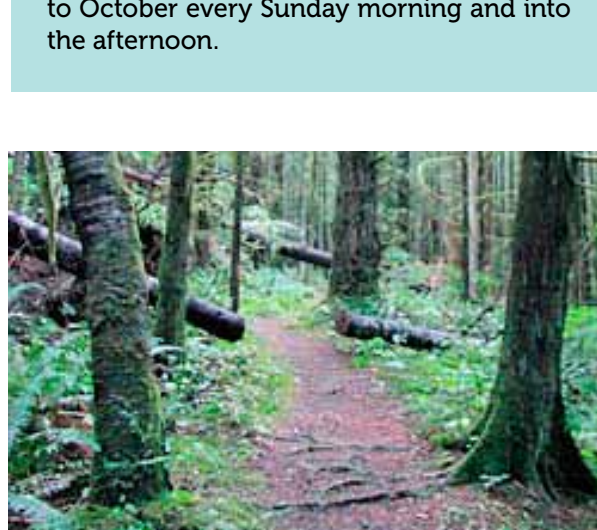
### Welcome to our Parks and Trails

Campbell River's natural beauty is showcased in its parks, trails and natural spaces. With more than 50 kilometres of trails and 1500 hectares of parkland and natural space, the City of Campbell River offers many opportunities to enjoy the spectacular outdoors.



### Centennial Park

A great way to cool off in the summer... Centennial Park is a fantastic place to spend a summer day. Play tennis. Picnic in the shade of the magnificent trees. Take a dip in the outdoor pool. Campbell River's seasonal outdoor pool is open June through August and offers a heated pool as well as a toddler wading pool.



### Greenways Loop Trail

For cyclists and pedestrians... A 25-kilometre recreational trail that provides an alternative and accessible transportation route around Campbell River. Portions of the Greenways Loop serve as wildlife corridors. With unique opportunities to be truly immersed in nature. The loop passes through lush forests, along spectacular shorelines and into the heart of the downtown.



### Dick Murphy Park

Picnic in paradise... Located on the Tye Spit, between the Campbell River estuary and Discovery Passage, Dick Murphy Park is an open, grassy area ideal for picnics, family gatherings and weddings. This is also a popular spot for dog walking, beachcombing, kayaking, bird watching or taking in the natural surroundings.



### Ken Forde Park

Under the stars... Gather family and friends around a beach fire and take in the exceptional ocean and mountain views. Time it right and you'll watch grand cruise ships gliding up and down the Strait of Georgia. Bald eagles, great blue herons, seals and the occasional pod of porpoises and whales are some of the wildlife wonders to view. Also a convenient place to launch your boat and spend the day out on the water.



### Penfield West Dog Park

Looking for a "paws-itive" experience... Campbell River's first fully-fenced off-leash dog area is at the north end of Penfield West Linear Park, which links the neighbourhood with the Beaver Lodge Forest Lands and the Dogwood bike path, a great dog-walking corridor.

This is the place for your four-legged friend to run free and socialize with other dogs. A small grove of trees gives pets another place to run and play, or relax in the shade. Dogs must be: older than four months, vaccinated, licensed, friendly and social. Dog handlers must keep dogs in sight and under voice control, stooping and scooping is required.



### Robert Ostler Park

In the heart of downtown... This waterfront park in the downtown core is a popular gathering spot for locals and visitors and a main venue for community events and festivities such as the annual Canada Day Festival.

Robert Ostler Park features a large grassy area with picnic tables, viewing benches, playground, washrooms, picnic shelter, totem poles, shade trees, gardens and a rocky beach wall.



### Rotary Seawalk

A leisurely stroll with breathtaking views... The Rotary Seawalk is an eight-kilometre paved walkway that follows the pebbled shoreline of Discovery Passage.

Running parallel to Highway 19A, the Seawalk is a popular route for cycle commuting, exercise, leisure or sightseeing. The well-maintained Seawalk is wheelchair friendly, and a great place to walk, run, bike, push a stroller or rollerblade.

See the chainsaw carvings at Frank James Park and the 50th parallel landmark along the way. Catch seals sunning themselves, herons fishing and eagles soaring.



### Rotary Beach Park

A quaint picture-perfect resting point along the Seawalk... Take in the incredible marine and mountain views. Enjoy the comings and goings of sailboats, fishing vessels, cargo ships and cruise ships. Ideal for a picnic or family gatherings.

### To book a Park or Sports Field

The City of Campbell River Recreation and Culture Department is responsible for booking all parks and sports fields (including some School District #72 fields).
